








What does Ofsted Say (March 2017)?

What do our results say (KS2 SATs 2018)?

Reminders and Notices

Procedures for 'Wet Drop Off'

May I remind parents that, when it is raining in the morning at drop off time, as a courtesy, we open the school at the hall entrance so that you can drop off without having to wait in the rain.

It has been brought to my attention that a number of parents were either requesting that they accompany their child into the school to their classroom, or indeed attempted to bypass the member of staff on duty at the door. Some of the exchanges were abrupt and rude, which is unacceptable. Your responsibility is to drop the children at the hall door, then leave promptly; the children are then in school, and safe in our care.

Congregating by the door is unhelpful and unsafe; it causes unnecessary congestion and creates a safeguarding risk.

I remind parents that this is a courtesy, not a statutory requirement and it is done to avoid you having to wait in the rain. If we experience ongoing issues in this, we may have to withdraw the courtesy.



I would like to congratulate you, your staff and your pupils on your school's outstanding achievement in the 2018 phonics screening check.

Achieving early fluency in decoding is a necessary first step in acquiring the key skill of reading.

There is a significant body of evidence that demonstrates that systematic phonics is the most effective method for teaching early reading. We want to ensure that every child develops a firm grasp of phonics, which is why I was delighted to see your results. With 96 per cent of pupils at St John Vianney RC Primary School reaching or exceeding the pass mark in the check, your school is in the top 7 per cent of all primary schools in the country.

This year's figures show that 89 per cent of pupils who achieve the expected standard in the check go on to achieve at least the expected standard in key stage 1 reading teacher assessment, which underlines the importance of developing the ability to decode words effectively at an early age.

Your success in teaching phonics and early reading so effectively means your pupils are developing a firm foundation in reading, from which they can become increasingly fluent and develop a lifelong love of reading.

Thank you for your work in this vital area of a child's early education and congratulations again to you and your staff for all you have achieved.


