
#### A reading from the St. Paul's Letter to the Romans

Dear sir/madam,

I am writing on behalf of Haringey Migrant Support Centre, a local charity providing legal advice and support to migrants in London (Charity number:1152227). We have recently set up a community wellbeing space in the parish hall of the Church of St John Vianney on West Green Road, to which everyone is welcome, including children and babies. Our volunteers cook a hot lunch and there are tea and coffee, games, reading, local information, etc. It is an opportunity for everyone to relax and share in a safe and welcoming environment. Special events are organised, such as information sessions, and art & craft activities.

As many of the people who come to the space are street homeless, destitute and experiencing food insecurity. We are trying to establish a small food bank for visitors, but we cannot do this without regular donations. We would therefore like to ask whether your business would be able to provide donations of food, toiletries or other essentials. The community space runs on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday of each month, and we could collect donations from you on either the Tuesday evening or the Wednesday morning. By donating you would be supporting deprived people within your community, many of whom have limited access to other forms of help.

This Lent, we are collecting food donations to help the Migrant Community in Haringey. Please, if you can spare something for this cause, you will be helping in a very direct way.



# What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Also known as Monkey Cool, this platform aims to fill the gap left by Omegle (which has now shut down) by placing users in random video chats with strangers. Participants use their mobile number and Snapchat username to connect to the service, where they can make matches, message other people and join group chats. The mobile version has been removed from the App Store due to safety concerns, but iPhone owners can still access the site via their web browser. The app remains available on Google Play, where its listing claims that Monkey has more than 30 million users worldwide.

#### DISCUSS THE DANGERS

Even if you're comfortable with your child using Monkey, it's still important to talk about the potential dangers. It's crucial, for instance, that young people recognise the risks that stem from video chatting with strangers, that they understand not to share identifying information (like their street or school name); and that they know what to do if they are exposed to inappropriate content.

#### REPORT INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

nkey states in the safety section of its site that "people are ren the power" and that, to a large extent, Monkey is alf-governing," If a user is exposed to sexually explicit or appropriate content on the platform, they can select the 'police' noil in the top right corner of their screen to submit a report for nkey's moderation team to review.

RESTRICT IN-APP PURCHASING

If your child is accessing Monkey via an Android device, you can prevent them from making in-app purchases through the device's settings. If you do allow your child to use the site, we'd recomm that you enable this feature; young people have been known to spend significant amounts of money in their desire to unlock more features in such as this.

#### SPOT THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child is spending too much time on Monkey – or that they may have been exposed to inappropriate or distressing content – It's important to watch for potential indications that they've been affected emotionally. They could be unusually irritable or unable to concentrate, for example, or failing to complete their homework or even to eat regular meals.


## Class 4:
