Parent Voice





Parent Voice is a committee of parent representatives, one from each class, which meets with the school leadership each half term. The aim of Parent Voice is to contribute to school improvement. It ensures that questions and suggestions from the wider parent community are forwarded in a constructive manner to the school and, where appropriate, used to improve aspects of school life for everybody.

The aims of Parent Voice are:

- * To encourage parents to participate fully in the life and work of the school
- * To ensure effective communication is maintained between all stakeholders
- * To be a forum for parents to express the views of their class.
- * To gain the support of parents and actively encourage them to participate in the process of school improvement

Parent Voice IS:

- * A body of parents that represents ALL parents.
- * A group that collates ideas and suggestions for consideration by the Headteacher and the Governing body.
- * A way for parents to learn more about the school.
- * A real way for parents to contribute to the successful running of the school.





Parent Voice IS NOT:

- * A way of tabling complaints about individuals.
- * A way of dealing with complaints from individual parents.
- * A decision making body appropriate suggestions are presented to the Headteacher and Governors for consideration.

How Can I Get Involved?

We need one volunteer from each class group to represent the whole school, from Nursery to Year 6.

Volunteers need to be able to commit to a meeting, once each half term, from 2pm to 3pm.

Volunteers must be supportive of the aims and intentions of Parent Voice, as outlined above.

The school will communicate your role to all parents so that they are aware of who they need to see to forward ideas and suggestions.

If you feel that you are able to support the school in this way, then please see me in the playground or let the office know.

In the event that more one volunteer comes forward for any given class, we may ask that the duties are shared over the course of a year.

We would be extremely appreciative of assistance in this important area, so thank you in advance for your consideration and time.

Parent Support—"Maths No Problem" Tutorials



Our newly implemented Maths Mastery scheme is proving a huge hit with teachers and children alike. It is a highly structured approach to teaching maths concepts, designed to leave no one behind and to deepen understanding!

The way in which concepts are explored and taught may be very different to the way in which you were taught yourself, so it is important that you have a good understanding of 'how they are being taught now.'



In order to help you to support your children at home, we have secured some parent support materials, which clearly explain the thinking and the teaching behind they key concepts - they are a fascinating watch! After having seen a few, you will see how carefully the teaching builds understanding and leaves nothing to chance.

This week, Mrs. Kennedy has been trialling and exciting new feature of Teaching and Learning in maths—**Peer Tutoring**. Put simply, this is confident maths pupils, teaching less confident pupils how to conquer key skills.


But it's not simple...the 'tutors' not only have to be confident in their subject, but they have to be skilled in explaining how the skill is constructed, how it uses other concepts we already know and, most importantly, they

The Tutors love it—they get a sense of satisfaction and deepen their own mastery. Their Peers love it— they get to have an in-depth discussion with a patient, knowledgeable and skilled friend (on a 1 to 1 basis!).

have to be skilled in 'not just giving the answer away'. Easier said than done—ask any teacher!

Research shows that children learning from each other is an extremely effective way of making progress, at all levels—it is a dictionary definition of a 'win-win', and if the children enjoy it, we have a perfect educational model!
