
CELEBRATING ROALD DAHL 100

Change to Friday Assembly Times: We had an excellent turn out from parents last Friday for our Friday assembly, which will now be held at 9am, rather than 10am, so thank you all managed to make it.

I would like to stress, however, that you are still welcome to have a coffee and a catch up in the Parents' Room **after** the assembly – this is a lovely tradition and it would be good to keep that going, so please – once assembly is over, feel free to stay.





Wet Mornings: In order to improve the comfort and safety for all on wet mornings, we will be asking parents to **drop their children at the entrance to the school hall at 8:45am**, rather than all convening in the hall itself. The children will make their way straight to class to engage with quiet activities until registration.

Vomiting and Diahorrea: Children who become ill with vomiting or diahorrea must remain at home for TWO DAYS after the onset of their illness in order to fully recover and to restrict the possibility of infecting others.

Attendance: All children are expected to attend school every day unless they are ill or there are exceptional circumstances. If your child is absent from school you will need to telephone the school office to explain the absence, preferably **before 8.45am**. When your child returns to school after absence you need to send a note explaining why he/she has been away.

Time off outside of school holidays **WILL NOT be authorised**, except in the most exceptional of circumstances. I ask you to please understand the position of the school in this sometimes delicate matter.

Punctuality: Please make every effort to ensure that your child is ready to start the day, promptly at **9.00am.** Latecomers miss out on important information and unsettle the other children. A child who arrives after the register has been started will receive a late mark in the register and those arriving after 9.30am will be recorded as an unauthorised absence. Frequent lateness will be followed up by me and may be referred to the Educational Welfare Officer.

Children should not be sent into school **before 8.50am** and need to be collected promptly at the end of the day as staff are not available to supervise them. We are, of course, always happy to support parents/carers if there are difficulties due to unforeseen circumstances or emergency situations.

School Meals:

- JUNIORS: The cost of a school meal remains at £2.40 per day, £12.00 each week. Please make cheques payable to 'St. John Vianney School'. If you would like to pay in advance for the half term, the total cost will be £79.20 (plus/less any arrears/overpayments). Please note that a week's written notice is required if you wish to change your child's meal arrangements. If you do not let us know, you will be liable for any costs that arise.
- INFANTS: All children from Reception Class to Year 2 are entitled to a free hot meal every day. However, if you are on a low income and in receipt of benefits, we would strongly advise you to apply for Free School Meals. If you are eligible for Free School Meals, the Government provides additional funding for your child and helps the school in many ways. We are very concerned that in the light of the free meals for infant children this funding will be reduced. Please see Mrs Alfonso if you think you are eligible.
- **PACKED LUNCHES**: Do ensure that there are no nuts and nut products in foods. Remember to include a small ice pack to keep food cool. Do not include sweets or drinks. Please try to ensure that your child always has some fresh fruit and that foods with high salt, sugar and fat content are kept to a minimum. Lunches should be packed into a sturdy, clearly labelled, plastic container so that they can be stored easily. Do not send in bags or rucksacks.

NUT ALLERGIES ~ A number of children in the school are allergic to nuts and products which contain traces of nuts. Reactions can be very severe and can result in death. We need to keep these children safe. Please check the contents of packed lunches for nuts and nut products and do NOT send any other food into school.

After School Club: A number of parents have been enquiring about the possibility of an afterschool club to support working families.

In the recent questionnaire, a good number indicated that they would either 'definitely' or 'probably' be interested in such a facility. Accordingly, I will be discussing the possibility with the school Governors, and will investigate options, costings, staffing and premises challenges before reporting back. You will appreciate that to cater for a medium to large number of families, much thought and planning needs to be carried out, and that in the immediate short term, we will be unable to provide after school care.
