They will provide a beautiful way for children, staff and visitors to get an insight into the thinking of our wonderful pupils!



In this newsletter, I will outline how you can quickly answer both of these questions, so that the link between the school and home is strengthened to the benefit of our children.


### **Curriculum Documents for Parents:**

We have published two documents on our website, which give invaluable information about the aims and content of the curriculum for each of your children's classes.


The <u>Overview of the National Curriculum</u> gives an 'at-a-glace' view of the topics and skills to be covered in each year group.

## Homework

### What you should expect

Homework is a topic often discussed and debated between home and school, and can be the source of confusion and frustration if either party are unsure of the purpose and expectations.

In response to some feedback, we have developed a whole school Homework Policy, which should clarify to teachers and parents exactly how this aspect of school/home life should operate.

It should be noted that, while homework is an opportunity to consolidate learning, develop independence and carry out research, research shows that it does NOT contribute significantly to children's progress. Good quality classroom teaching and learning is the priority at all times, while homework is used to develop independent habits.

Reading remains the most important part of learning outside of the classroom, and you should encourage your child to read every day.
