















G, for his boundless enthusiasm both in music, and for the first Year 5 Zoom call.








At this time, when children may be spending **more** time on the internet than usual, it is doubly important that we understand what they are doing (and with whom).

The best way of ensuring that children are safe is to make sure that they are working within your supervision, and that you regularly check what they are doing, and even work with them.

The Department for Education has listed the sites below as being useful for you as parents to make sure you are doing your best to ensure that your children's internet usage is safe and productive.
