Dear Parents and Carers

Due to increased access to numerous different technology platforms, many children are at a greater risk of exposure to inappropriate content, cyber bullying or even grooming online. At St. John Vianney, we believe that promoting online safety plays a critical role in protecting our children online. We are writing to you today as we believe it is important for us to work in partnership with you as a parent, to keep pupils safe online.

Our online safety measures enable us to provide an environment for all our pupils to thrive, grow and learn, whilst staying safe online. We put these measures in place through policies and security provisions which pupils against unsuitable content and contact, and ensure they maintain appropriate conduct.

These policies include our Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy, Online Safety Policy and Acceptable Use Agreements. If any incidents breaching these policies occur, they are logged and managed in accordance with the relevant policy.

We have a number of procedures in place to ensure children cannot access unsuitable websites when using school technology, including filtering software which blocks all websites with adult, violent or age-inappropriate content. Social media sites are also blocked, unless they are school pages used within lessons and under supervision. Online safety is taught to all pupils during Computing lessons and staff undertake online safety training to update their knowledge.

There are many ways **you** can help minimise the risks associated with children being online and increase online safety in your home – the list below provides ideas for some of the ways you can do this.

Please see the 'tips' and advice over the page and I would like to let you know that we will be inviting you to join us in the second half of the Autumn Term for a workshop that will help equip you with the knowledge to help keep your children safe online



Top Tips and Useful Links:

1. Only give your children devices or access to devices that you feel comfortable with, and not as a result of peer-pressure deriving from their classmates/friends who are also using those devices. e.g. gaming systems and mobile phones at a young age.

2. Talk to your children about why it is important to stay safe online. Explain that whilst the internet is a fun, exciting and knowledge-rich tool, it is also a place where people may wish to bring them into dangerous activities or expose them to unpleasant material. It is important to be clear that you are not saying your child may never use the internet again, or that everything on it is harmful – it is about teaching them to have a greater awareness and to be able to manage and report any risks.

3. Discuss rules for being online and draw them up together, including which sites, games, etc., are acceptable. If certain games are off-limits, try to explain why, for example, because of excessive violence. If your child uses online gaming, consider setting rules, such as only talking to others in the same age range and having the conversation on speaker, rather than headphones, so you can monitor it.

4. Discuss what information should be private and what is ok to share; for example, addresses, names of schools, and names should never be given out to strangers online, as this could allow them to identify where your child goes to school or lives.

5. Keep an open dialogue with your child – letting them know they can always talk to you about anything that has made them feel uncomfortable online is key to keeping them safe.

6. Ensure all devices used by your child are kept in a communal space, or a space where they can be supervised whilst using their devices.

7. If your child uses a mobile device then set parental controls – do this as a dialogue with your child so they are aware of what they are not allowed to view; however, do not rely on parental controls on devices, as they are not always 100 percent effective and many children know how to bypass them.

8. Make sure your child knows how to report or 'block' unsuitable content, messages or people online – show them how to block on the websites or games they frequently use and explain that they can always tell you, a teacher or another adult if they experience anything which makes them feel uncomfortable.

What to do if your child has a negative 'online' experience...





If your child receives inappropriate contact 'online', whether it be via; messages, images or videos this can be extremely distressing for not only the child, but the rest of the family too. The content of the communication could be inappropriate (sexualised or pornographic) or may be threatening or deemed as bullying.

How to respond if your child shares they have had a negative experience



We would encourage you to talk to your child about CEOP & promote them as the 'Internet Police' - they may well have heard about them before at school.

Take some time to visit 'thinkuknow' with your child & explore it together!



Child Exploitation and Online Protection Command (CEOP) are part of the UK National Crime Agency and are tasked with investigating child sex offenders, including those involved in the production, distribution and viewing of child abuse material, to the UK courts.



CEOP have their own website -<u>thinkuknow.co.uk</u> which has fantastic resources and support for children and young people of all ages.



The rosary can be said by yourself or with your family or a group at school or at church. If prayed with a group, someone usually acts as the prayer leader. In the following prayers, the leader prays the words in **blue** and everyone else responds with the rest of the prayer.



The Sign of the Cross

(said to start the rosary prayer)

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. *Amen.*

The Apostles' Creed

(said at first, holding the crucifix)

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended into hell. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. *Amen.*

The Lord's Prayer/Our Father

(said holding the single large bead before each decade)

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread;

and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

The Hail Mary

(said holding each of the 10 beads in the decade)

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with you; blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

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The Glory Be

(said at the end of each decade, before the next Our Father)

Glory be to the Father,

and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

The Fatima Prayer

(said after the Glory Be at the end of each decade)

0 my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell; lead all souls to heaven, especially those who have most need of your mercy.

The Hail, Holy Queen

(said after the final decade)

Hail, holy Queen, mother of mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To you do we cry, poor banished children of Eve; to you we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn, then, most gracious advocate, your eyes of mercy toward us; and after this, our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of your womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary. Amen.



The Final Prayer

(said after the Hail, Holy Queen

Pray for us, 0 holy Mother of God. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ. Let us pray:

O God, whose only begotten Son, by his life, death, and resurrection, has purchased for us the rewards of eternal life, grant, we beseech thee, that while meditating on these mysteries of the most holy rosary of the blessed Virgin Mary, we may imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise, through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
